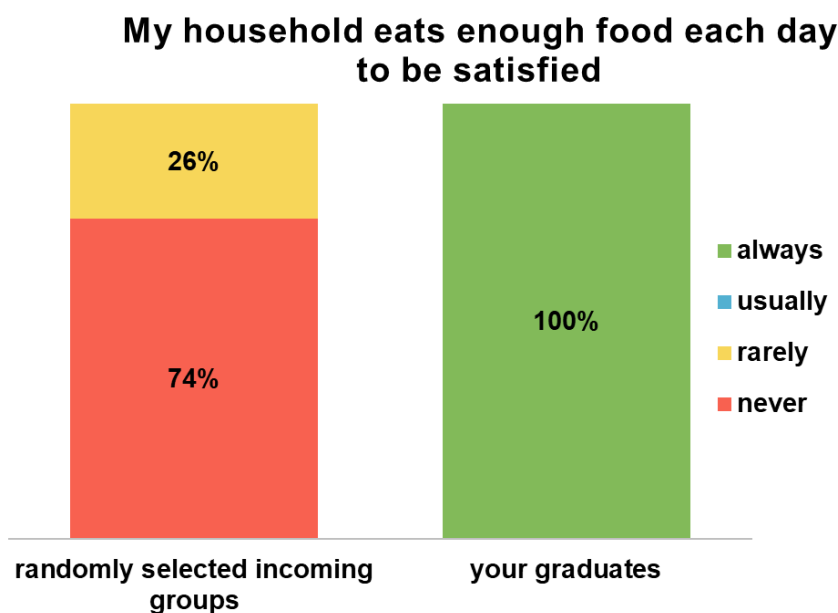
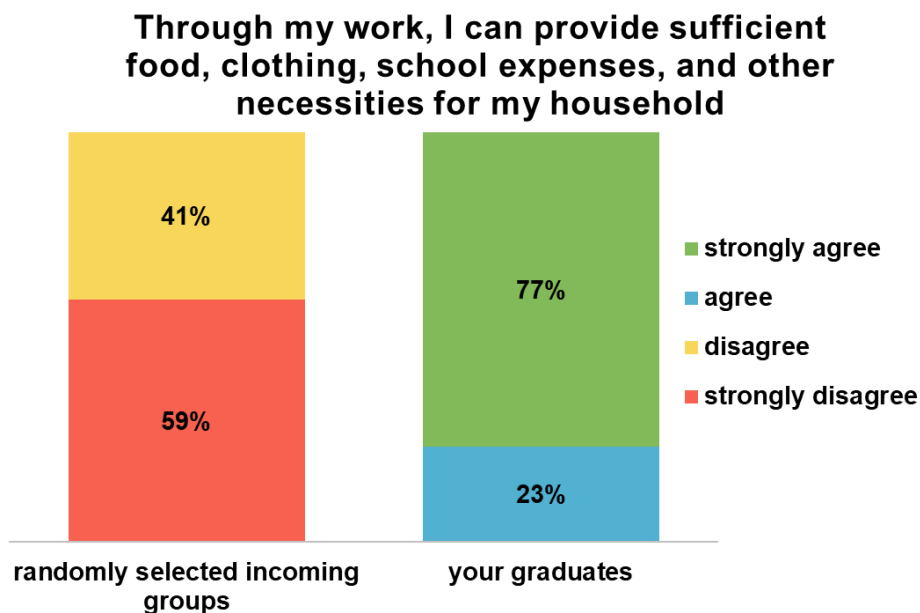
Graduation marks an important milestone, and we celebrate all that these young people have accomplished during their three years in the Zoe Empowers program in Rwanda. The following graduation information is compiled from surveys given to every household in your group at the time of graduation. To put this data into context, we are also showing the baseline conditions of randomly selected and surveyed Rwanda groups which started in the same year.

Some statistics from graduation:

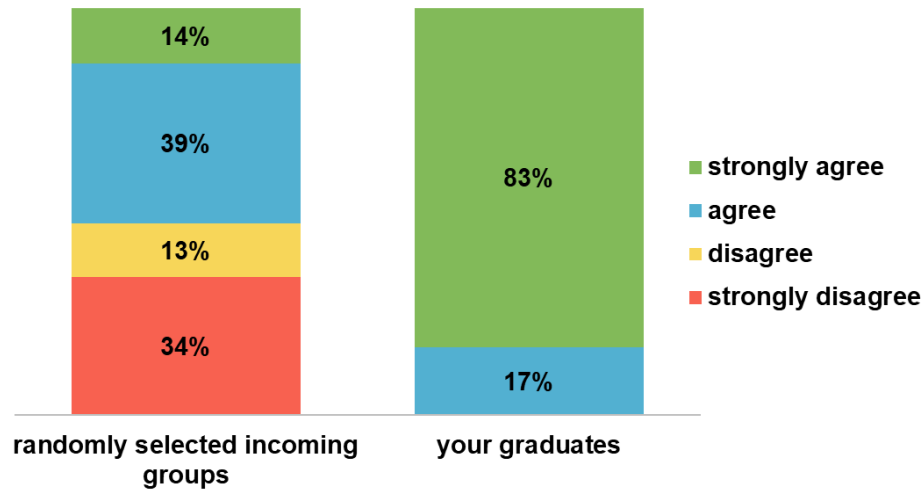
- 30 households were surveyed at graduation
- 77 income projects are currently run by group participants; all households have 2 or more projects
- 22 youth (including siblings) received training in a skilled trade
- All households have access to an improved source of drinking water or use an appropriate water treatment method
- 93% of the households have electricity

Eleven groups with 280 households provided the **incoming data in 2022**.

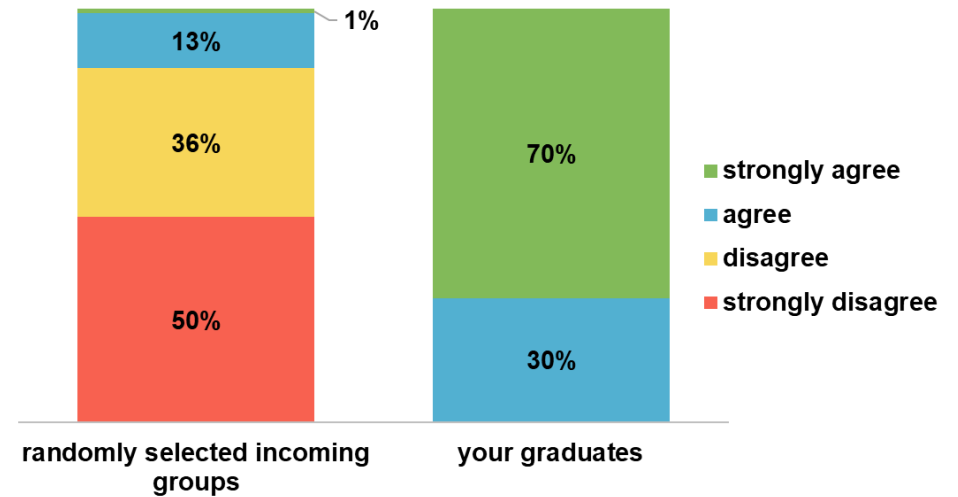
The **graduate data** are responses to the survey given to all the heads of household in **your group in 2025**.



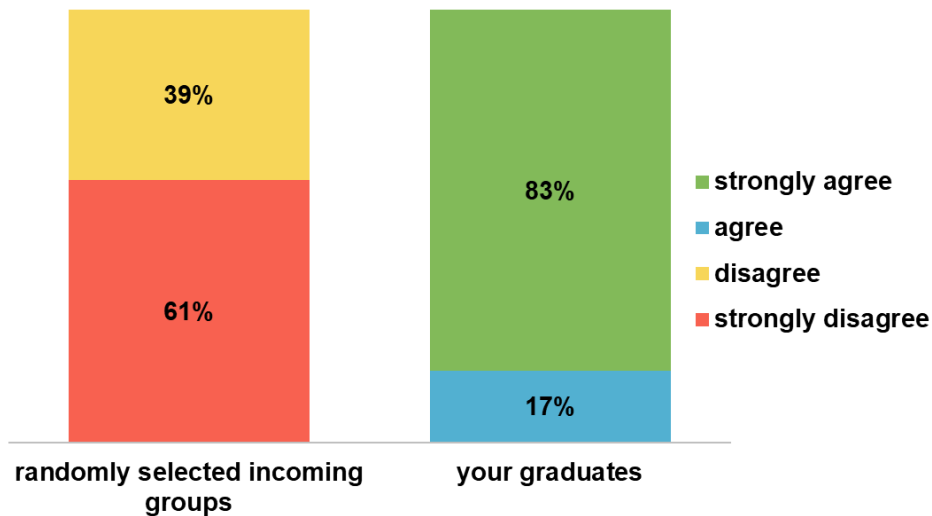
I have access to medical care



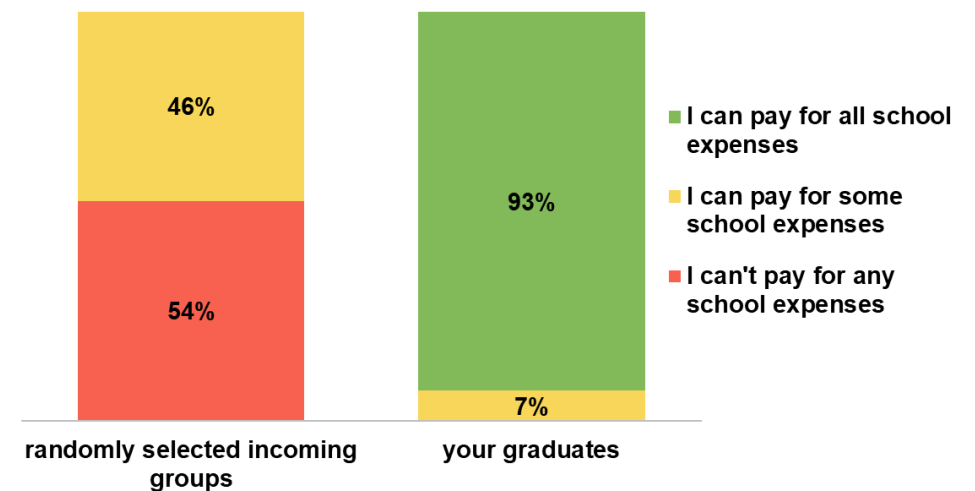
I live in an adequate/safe house



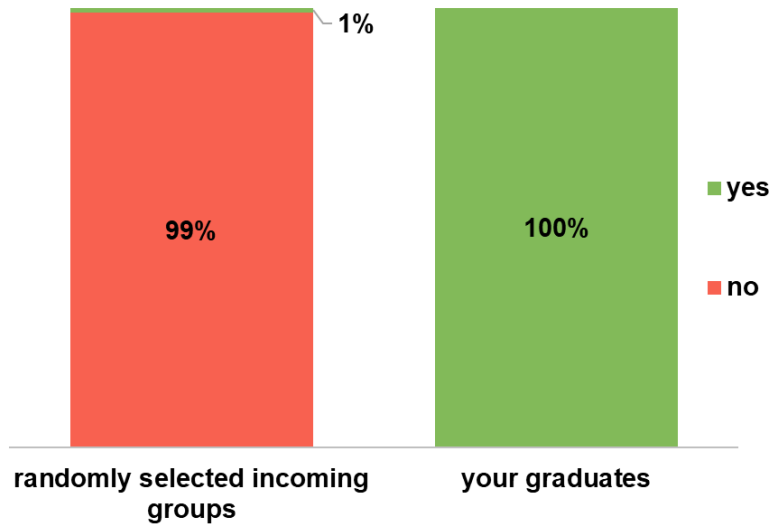
I know my rights and can enforce them



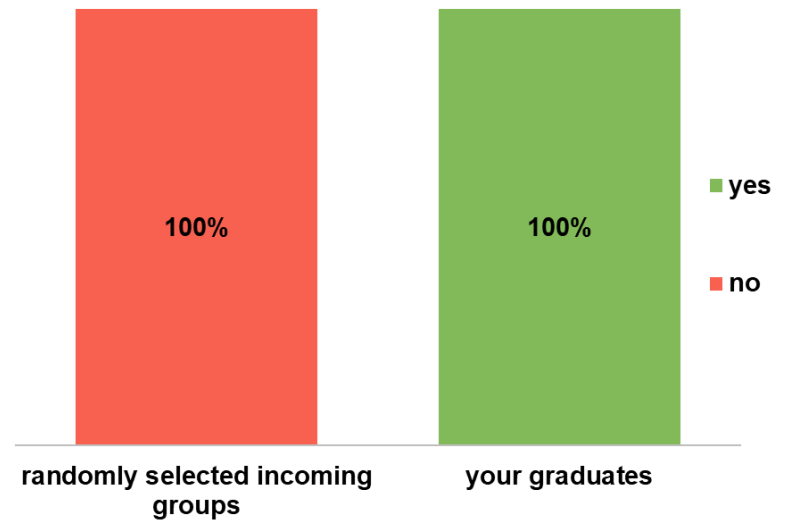
Are you able to pay the expenses for all of the school-aged children in your household?



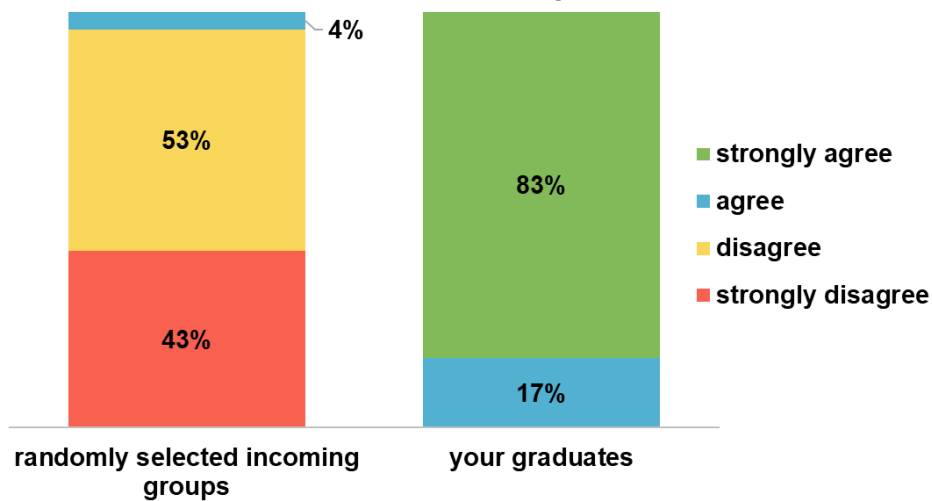
Have you shared food or other resources with people not in the Zoe program in the past year?



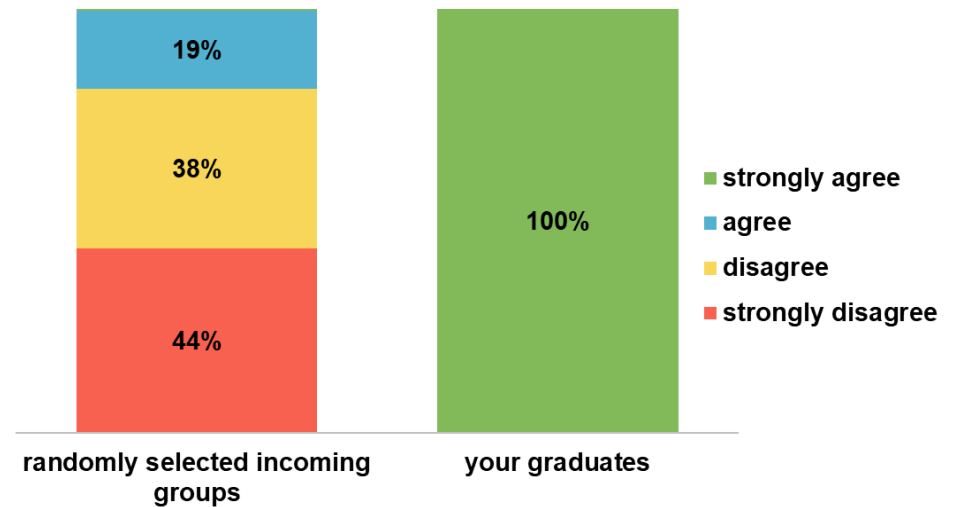
Do you hire any other people to help with your income projects, crops, or livestock?



I feel that I am a valued member of the community

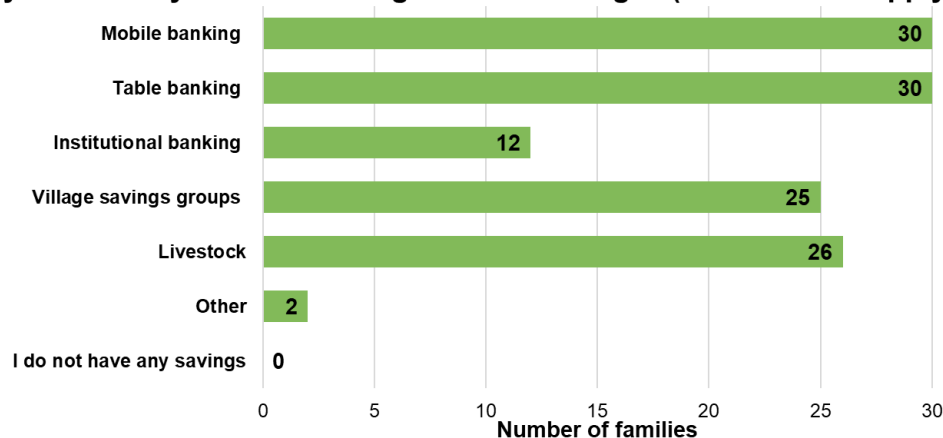


I feel that God loves me



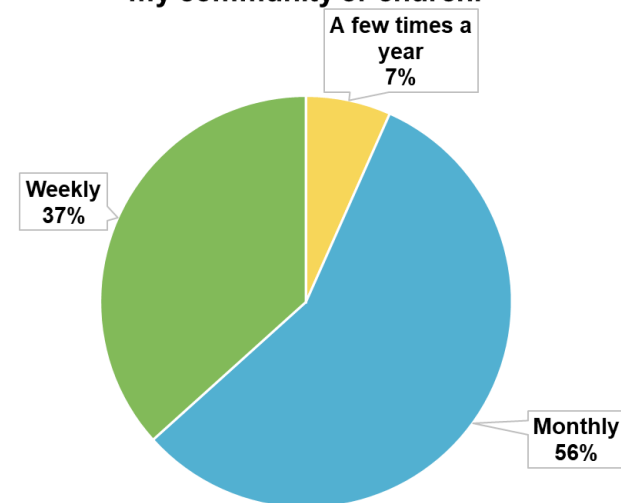
The following charts show only the graduate data:

Do you have any of the following forms of savings? (check all that apply)



None of the households surveyed when they entered the Zoe program had savings of any kind. Table banking is the most common form of saving for Zoe groups. These funds are created through group contributions and youth can get loans from the fund to expand businesses or address other needs. Low interest repayments on loans accumulate in the fund and are periodically distributed among group participants.
